## Lions Club recognizes West Prairie principal for decades of dedication

The theme for this year's Colchester Labor Day celebration is "Wonderful World of Children." As sponsors of the event, the Colchester Lions Club is responsible for choosing someone to serve as Grand Marshal of the annual parade.

The selection committee didn't think long before West Prairie Middle School principal Eunice Lutz came to mind.

"All the members of the committee knew that she had been at our school for a number of years," said club president Ryan Hunt. "I went through the Colchester school system and I remember her being there."

Lutz has been around a while. The 2006-07 school year will be her 36th with the district.

During that time, Lutz has impressed the public with her "dedication and caring," Hunt said.

"She does really care about (her students) and their progress, and she's shown that throughout her years of service," he said.

Lutz said she has "grown up" with many area families. She has even taught two generations in some. "I said when I got to third, that's probably when I need to retire," she joked.

Colchester has a very family-oriented atmosphere, she said, which was a welcome change from the

## Art around the world

## Former Macomb resident and working artist has traveled to almost every continent

Former Macomb resident and working artist Vae (Cunningham) Hamilton said she has lived her life with three goals in mind.

"To be the best artist I can be, to be on every continent in the world and to be an interesting old lady," she said, listing her life's goals.

Although she has traveled to every continent except Antarctica, some may say she succeeded in the other two.

A working artist for nearly 30 years, Hamilton said art has been a passion throughout her life.

"That's about the only thing I was ever good at, to tell you the truth," she said.

Her father, Richard Cunningham, worked at Federal Land Bank in McDonough, Hancock and Schuyler counties for 30 years as a land appraiser. He gave her much inspiration as a child. Hamilton remembers her early art experience with plat books.

"(Her father) would go out and use an auger to get soil samples and then we'd go back and do the plat books and color in the areas," she said.

Hamilton said she often refers to childhood memories when her artist's well runs dry, which sometimes happens. She said she often comes back to visit her mother, Ollie Cunningham, who still lives in Macomb.

"I have to go back to my childhood to things that really mean something to me," she said. "For instance at the

Catholic cemetery, there's an angel that I used to see when I was a little girl going out to Glenwood Park. And I did a series on her. She's called the Macomb Angel. And she's a stone for a little boy who died. I've painted her I bet 25 times. It's just something that ... has to speak to the insides of us," she said.

Hamilton said one of her biggest influences is her high school art teacher at the former WIU Lab School, Dr. Don Scharfenberg, who encouraged her to go to college to study art. She continued her art studies at Colorado University.

Hamilton and her husband, Gene, who is also from Macomb and used to own Hamilton Office Supply, currently live in North Carolina where he has been a broker for Edward Jones for 20 years.

During the Christmas season Vae distributes homemade Christmas cards. She started the tradition about 15 years ago when a pet dog she loved dearly died. That year's Christmas card depicted the dog with an angel, later dubbed "The Christmas angel."

"I think animals have angels too and it was sort of an uplifting angel, so it just sort of started a

tradition," she said.

She started depicting the angel every year to represent the loss of a loved pet or person.

"Every year it was about that passage," she said.

Last year, she decided to change the card and did not paint the Christmas Angel. She took a different approach and painted her living poodles, without the Christmas angel.

"People got so upset because it wasn't the Christmas angel. I mean really, I got phone calls,"

## Masons keep kids safe by running them through CHIP assembly line

Stories of childhood abductions terrify parents. The Quincy Scottish Rite Masons say there is something moms and dads can do to increase the odds of their child's safe return in the event of a kidnapping - prepare a package of identification materials before something ever happens.

In fact, the Masons are willing to do it for you, free of charge.

The Masons will operate a Child ID Program (CHIP) assembly line Friday

in the Colchester City Park as part off the community's annual Labor Day celebration. The Colchester Lions Club is sponsoring the booth.

The CHIP passport assembly line involves four simple steps. (The process does not include implanting microchips under the skin, in case you were wondering.)

First, Masons will record each child's name, age and the date on an ID passport. The child is then photographed, weighed, measured and fingerprinted. Lastly, a DNA sample is taken from inside the cheek. Tooth impression sam-

ples also are available.

That information is then placed in a plastic envelope and given to the parents, who are encouraged to store it in a safe place. If the child should ever turn up missing, the parents can turn the envelope over to authorities.

Marvin Johnson, a member of Denver Lodge 464 and Hancock County Lodge 20, will be overseeing the booth, with the assistance of Macomb Lodge 17 members DeWayne Sorrells and company.

Johnson personally experienced the importance of this program when his

cousin was killed in an accident.

A year after his cousin's death, the body had to be exhumed. Unfortunately, due to the nature of the accident, the exhumation proved difficult. DNA samples helped identify the remains.

Johnson has read about more pleasant incidents where children were rescued because their parents had similar information to give to police.

she said. "So next year I'll have to go back to angels, or just move farther away I suppose," she joked.

Rather than sticking with one technique and form, Vae's art is versatile and encompasses almost every medium. Although she thinks of herself as a painter, she said collage is one of her favorite mediums and loves to use digital photography.

She said she does something art-related every day, and sometimes she uses her creativity to write in her journal. The pages of her journal often can create material for her next art endeavor.

"I don't always sit down with paint. Sometimes I use my camera and I journal every day," she said. "It

And, she knows how to relax. During this interview she was getting a facial.

"It's hard to talk and think when you're laying flat on your back, you know that?" she joked.

# Lincoln logs a literacy record

Lincoln school students set a world record Aug. 24.

Mrs. Ruebush's 20 kindergarten students, along with five other elementary classes and a day-long event at the Macomb Public Library, contributed to a nationwide effort to engage stu-

dents in literacy. A world record for the most children reading the same book on the same day also was set.

Nearly 200 children across Macomb read "The Little Engine that Could."

Local toy store owner and former teacher Noelle Flynn introduced the event to Mrs. Ruebush who then informed other teachers and the library.

"The Magic Dragon was founded on the idea of learning through playing," Flynn said. "This was the perfect opportunity to engage children and promote literacy in a fun, memorable way."

Lincoln school students were able to watch the Today Show's Matt Lauer read "The Little Engine that Could" to children in Rockefeller Square and

hear how they contributed to the record 60-million plus children who read the book that morning.

Mrs. Ruebush said she embraced the event simply because it was nationally publicized.

"When they see something they are doing promoted on TV it gets them excited," she said. "I'm for anything that gets them excited about reading."

Jumpstart, a national service organization partnering college students with pre-school age children, organized the initiative. Jumpstart works with Head Start and other pre-school organizations to prepare each student for life-long learning before they enter school.

Jumpstart's partners in the project among others were Starbucks, who distributed the book and donated \$1 for every book sold, American Eagle and Pearson, publisher of Penguin Young Books. Along with Lauer, Read for the Record's honorary

chair was First Lady Laura Bush.

Macomb Librarian Dennis Danowski said building a strong educational foundation in literacy teaches children how to learn and prepares them for life.

"This is important. We have to teach, we have to involve kids in order for them to progress," he said. "Literacy is crucial. If you can't read, you can't fill out a job application, forms (etc.) ... it's a basic need for society."

Mrs. Ruebush used the lesson to remind her students that anytime they ran across something that was difficult during the school year to remember the little train.

"I don't want to hear you say you can't do anything," she said. "Just repeat I think I can, I think I can..."

## Mountain climbing

As noted in Friday's issue of the Eagle, Macomb was rated 94th out of 577 "micropolitan" areas in the country. This is good, but what could be done to improve that standing and correspondingly, improve Macomb's quality of life?

Macomb was rated a 3.91 on Bizjournals' quality of life index. Put in context, the top scorer in the study was Bozeman, Mont., elevation, 4,950 feet, at 12.64. Forty-seventh place went to Kalispell, Mont., with 5.99 and around 2,915 feet elevation, or about half way to Bozeman.

Now Bozeman might be too high to aspire to, but lowly Kalispell just more than a point better, yet 50 entire places above Macomb, could be within reach.

Macomb is near the bottom of the list in population growth, income and income growth, at 510th, 397th and 432nd respectively. These are big issues where inroads are finally being cut.

Macomb has marginal placements of 122nd in affordable housing and 174th in proximity to a city larger than 2.5 million people. Affordable housing depends on the first three categories, and not much can be done about moving closer to St. Louis, so progress in those areas is a wash.

But, Macomb was near the top, or at least

above the 50 marker in four areas: management or professional jobs, commuting, bachelor's degrees and graduate degrees, at 38th, 45th, 34th and 11th in that order.

That leaves taxation and small businesses as categories to make up that measly little point and move into the top 10 percent.

For the first, steady economic development practices are drawing more people to the area and spurring property value back into an upward motion, which could eventually decrease the amount of property taxes per \$1,000. Also much of the development in the late 1990s will be back on the tax rolls soon from the 10-year Enterprise Zone exemption, and pending projects outside the EZ could provide much needed assistance in maintaining Macomb's taxing districts without raising taxes.

The result would be better quality of life ... at least according to the study.

For the other, small businesses thrive off of disposable income and

no one has more cash to spend than tourists. It was just announced that Hancock County had the greatest increase in tourist revenue in the state. Nauvoo received more than 1 million visitors after the Mormon temple re-opened and continues to see as many as 900,000 tourists every year. That is 900,000 people 45 minutes away. Nauvoo officials claim the influx contributes \$22 million per year to their economy. Granted Macomb does not have any Mormon-related attractions, but hey, Mormons are people too. After all, WIU faculty did compose the "City of Joseph" which was produced annually in Nauvoo up until a few years ago. Even a billboard announcing where Macomb is would bring some people over.

These few improvements would not raise Macomb to Bozeman's lofty heights but could put us well on the way to Kalispell's tree line.
